Philips Long explores the meaning of the biblical history of Israel's vital transition from a confederation of tribes to nationhood under a king. In three volumes, historian Jole Shackelford delineates the history of the study of biological rhythms—now widely known as chronobiology—from antiquity into the twentieth century.
