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The Honey Bus: A Girl Raised by Bees is a memoir about a girl's journey into the heart of a beehive to find herself.

In March 2006 I performed my thesis role in the production, As Bees in Honey Drown, directed by Dr. Rinda Frye at the University of Louisville. I played the role of Alexa Vere de Vere, a role that I did not, until recently, feel equipped to play. In this thesis I will come to terms with a fear that has plagued me for years: stage fright. In doing so, I will review each of the roles I performed throughout my graduate career. I will discuss the way in which each role brought to me a new sense of enlightenment. I will show how through both triumphs and failures I identified my weaknesses. I will present the obstacles I faced with each production and how I was able to use the tools I received through one production and apply them to the next.
