Simply put a stock chart is just a visual representation of the price of a stock across a defined timeframe. The chart consists of individual "candlesticks" that show the opening, closing, high, and low prices each day for the market they represent over a period of time. 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In Elliott Wave theory, a stock goes through 5 waves in an uptrend. In the chart above, the first wave after the breakout is wave 1.
