In fiscal year 1981-82, state and local government spending actually exceeded federal nondefense spending. However, past research in public finance has focused on federal spending and policies and paid little attention to the economic problems of state and local governments. In this book, entitled "Military Conscription: an economic analysis of the labour component in the armed forces", military conscription is regarded as an economic policy to minimize the cost of labour in the armed forces. If conscripts were free to choose whether to join the armed forces, many would not under the present day conditions, since for them the costs of conscription far outweighs the benefits. The principle of opportunity costs is always central in the economics of warfare.
