There are many different approaches and techniques you can use to conduct discourse analysis, but the steps below outline the basic steps you need to follow. Once you have developed your question, select a range of material that is appropriate to answer it.

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Critical self-reflection must accompany the research process continuously: from the choice of the object under investigation to the choice of methods (categories) of analysis, the sampling, the construction of a theoretical framework designed for the object under investigation (middle range theories), to the interpretation of the results and possible recommendations for practice following the study.
