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The archipelago of St Kilda, the remotest part of the British Isles, lies in the Atlantic Ocean, 41 miles (66 kilometres) west of Benbecula in Scotland's Outer Hebrides. Its islands, with their exceptional cliffs and sea stacks, are rich in wildlife and form the most important seabird breeding station in north-west Europe.

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Lying 41 miles off the west coast of Benbecula, the archipelago of St Kilda is an extreme Atlantic outpost, and one of the few World Heritage Sites in existence awarded 'Dual' status for meeting both the natural and cultural criteria for the classification. With its clear waters and craggy sea cliffs (including one that ranks as Europe's highest) it is not surprising that St Kilda is home to the continent's largest colony of seabirds including gannets and puffins.

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St Kilda (Scottish Gaelic: Hiort) is an isolated archipelago situated 40 miles (64 km) west-northwest of North Uist in the North Atlantic Ocean. It contains the westernmost islands of the Outer Hebrides of Scotland. The largest island is Hirta, whose sea cliffs are the highest in the United Kingdom.

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St Kilda is an isolated archipelago of volcanic islands that lie 40 miles to the west of the main archipelago chain. With the highest sea cliffs in Britain, St Kilda is the most important sea bird breeding station in north west Europe.

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Internationally recognised for its birdlife, St Kilda is no less famous for its human history. A community existed here for at least 4,000 years, exploiting the dense colonies of gannets, fulmars and puffins for food, feathers and oil. The final 36 islanders were evacuated in 1930.

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St Kilda was continuously inhabited for two millennia or more, from the Bronze Age to the 20th century. However, little is known of the early history, the first written record of which dates from the late 14th century when John of Fordun mentions 'the isle of Irte, which is agreed to be under the Circius and on the margins of the world'. The islands were historically part of the domain of the MacLeods of Harris whose steward was responsible for the collection of rents in kind and other duties. T

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St Kilda is a dual UNESCO world heritage site and national nature reserve. It's home to the world's largest colony of Gannets & Fulmars. Also the biggest colony of puffins in Britain with highest sea cliffs and sea stacks in Britain. Visit St Kilda to experience dramatic scenery, spectacular seabirds and unique isolation to ponder their poignant history.

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St Kilda — which is one of the westernmost islands of the Outer Hebrides of Scotland — is best known for its towering cliffs, sea views and the UK's largest colony of Atlantic puffins. While its final 36 islanders were evacuated in 1930 (this is because it was deemed 'unfit' to live here), over 3,000 visitors still visit each year.
