### A Brief History of the Stonewall Brigade - The Stonewall ...

The Stonewall Brigade was a collection of five Virginia infantry regiments and an artillery battery in the Confederate Army of Northern Virginia during the American Civil War (1861–1865). Trained and first led by Thomas J. "Stonewall" Jackson , it was perhaps the most accomplished—and certainly one of the most famous—units of its kind in American military history.

On the 17th, however, the men of the Stonewall Brigade again packed their blanket rolls, shouldered arms and began marching northwards for a new campaign, this time against a new Federal Army being organized around Manassas Junction under General John Pope. On 9 August, the brigade would run into Pope at the Battle of Cedar Mountain. The 33rd Regiment fought fiercely throughout the battle, taking 17 casualties.

The Stonewall Brigade was often in the thick of it. In the murderous fighting in the ‘Bloody Angle’ at Spotsylvania in May 1864, all but 200 of its men

were killed, wounded, or captured.

After being utterly decimated at the Bloody Angle, the old Stonewall Brigade was reduced to something less than 300 men. If I understand correctly, it was basically consolidated into a single regiment which was folded in with other remnants of shattered Virginia regiments to form a brigade of Gordon's division.

### Question about the Stonewall Brigade Post-Spotsylvania ...

In a matter of minutes, the 17th, along with troops from Welsh's Brigade and remnants of the Kanawha Division, inflicted about 650 casualties on the 1300 men of Dayton's Brigade - a loss of 50%. One of Drayton's men who lay dead at Fox's Gap was Lt. Col. George S. James of the 3rd South Carolina Battalion.

This reputation was enhanced during Jackson's Shenandoah Valley campaign and other operations where the Stonewall Brigade's actions gained the praise of their Confederate compatriots and the respect of their enemies.

The Stonewall Brigade and its first commander, Thomas J. Jackson, won their nickname at the bloody baptism of First Manassas. Over the next four years "Jackson's foot cavalry" achieved fame and sustained losses matched by few American military units before or since. There were some 2,600 men serving in the brigade at the start of the war.

'Look!' There is Jackson standing like a stone wall. Rally behind the Virginians!' With these words General Bee ensured the reputation of Thomas Jackson and his troops who were fighting alongside him at the battle of the the First Bull Run. This reputation was enhanced during Jackson's Shenandoah

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March 23, 1862 - Confederate general Richard B. Garnett commands the Stonewall Brigade at the Battle of Kernstown. During the battle he orders his men to withdraw without orders from his commander, Thomas J. "Stonewall" Jackson, and subsequently is placed under arrest and charged with neglect of duty.
