But his party loyalty was suspect. Churchill had only to see the shadow of Hitler from afar to become the first anti-Nazi in England. But his voice was not heeded by the policy-makers as England moved down the road toward Munich. Only when the darkest hour had come was he called to the helm. Today, square-hewn, fearless, defiant, Churchill stand as the great adversary of barbarism fighting the fight of humanity.
